Who's willing to offer \$200 for Felipe Alou? That's what the Giants gave him as a bonus when they signed him as a 20-year-old in the Dominican Republic 11 years ago. Young men were not very wise in baseball

ways in the Dominican in those days. In fact, baseball was sort of dawdling along and little boys of Alou's age knew little of the game until the Dodgers came to Santo Domingo (then Ciudad Trujillo) to train at the request of President Trujillo in 1948.

Jackie Robinson and Roy Campanella became

Alou's idols and baseball became his game, though he later participated in the Pan-American Games as a javelin thrower and runner from his island country. After the track events were over, he was invited to play on the Dominican baseball team. When he led his team in batting, the Giants signed him, and his course in due time led to San Francisco and, by trade two seasons ago, to the Braves.

Alou started off hitting in spring training this year, batting .339 in Florida, where he was the Braves' most effective hitter. He couldn't tell the difference when the calesthenics were over and the season was on, for he kept on hitting, and uncorked a streak of 14 straight games, including a 5-for-5 performance in an 11-3 win over the Giants, April

Putting together the longest streak in the big leagues did not make Alou the hottest hitter. His average was a fairly modest .339, but he led the Braves in hits, 19, had hit five home runs and driven in eight tallies from a leadoff position.

"Best leadoff man in the business," said Bobby Bragan, who has also been known to say, "I've never managed a finer player, both on and off the field."

Alou has also given the Braves a supreme job of outfielding, sprinkling his defensive work with catches like those by Willie Mays.

Alou sparkled before Atlanta's crowd of 43,000, April 24, when he struck two home runs off Mets' pitching. Unfortunately, the rest of the Braves were not as muscular and the Braves lost the game, the second of a double-header, 4-3.

Alou at one time was one of three brothers on the Giants. On occasion, he played the outfield with brothers Matty and Jesus, a milestone in big league baseball. However, the brother act was broken up by trade, when Felipe went to the Braves and, last winter, Matty FURMAN BISHER. went to the Pirates.
