WILLIAM BENJAMIN (BEN) CHAPMAN

Outfielder, New York Yankees. Born, December 25, 1903, Nashville, Tenn. Height, six feet, 10 inches. Bats and throws right-handed. Home address, 2501 Pike avenue, Ensley, Ala.

BEST base runner since Ty Cobb and Max Carey! Not such an extravagant statement when Ben Chapman's marks are analyzed. His 61 thefts in 1931 exceeded records of all others since 1912...

While stealing 61 times in 1931, Ben was caught in act only 23 times. He is faster man than Cobb was. Ty's daring, high spikes and ability to outsmart pitcher on get-away carried him to heights...

His roughing up of Buddy Myer of Washington club resulted in free-for-all fight at Capital Park April 25, this year. Chapman goes into bag hard, but is not known as deliberately violent with spikes...

Chapman, right-handed pitcher, who began career with Cleburne, Tex., 1908, and later played with teams in Kitty League, Three-I, and Southern Association. Dad's career ended, 1917. Taught Ben to handle ball when he was mere tot.

Family located in Birmingham when Papa Chapman quit traveling in minors. Young Ben went to Phillips School there, then to high school at Indian Creek and serving as bat boy for Birmingham Barons. Parents wanted him to go to college and he entered Purdue University in Indiana in 1927...

Has beaten several of mates, as well as Carl Reynolds, when latter was with White Sox, at 100 yards. Babe Ruth has standing offer to wager on his outfield companion taking measure of any player in game in race.

Follows strange theory. When he is going well, he will not take bats in practice. When he is in case of overdoing a good thing. Likes fast automobiles. Is easily wrought up and has quick temper. Then becomes awfully sorry. Had feud with Ruth last year because he said something to Babe when Ben did something wrong at the plate. This spring he went to Ruth and apologized and they are friends now.

When Ben gets on base, he gets Lazzari, who follows him, half nutty, trying to keep up with Ben's sudden shifts in signs. He'll put on steal or hit-and-run in twinkling of an eye.

Enthusiastic radio fan and carries his own receiver around with him. Rooms with Dixie Walker, fellow townsman from Birmingham. Chapman's favorite clubhouse sport in St. Louis is kidding the clubhouse man. Logan likes to tell the boys about Coach and Speaker. Chapman gets him wild by asking, 'Who was Cobb?'
