BUCKY GIVEN RANK WITH ABLEST LEADERS

Every Member of Washington Team Entitled to Equal Share of Credit for Victory, Comments Eaton.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 15.—The Washington team won a championship. Oh, joy! It was a battle of bulldogs, and the Griffith won because he deserved it.

ST. PAUL TEAM WINS JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP

Victory Makes Third Time Association Flag Winner Has Taken Class AA Honors in Five Years.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Oct. 14.—The Champion St. Paul team of the American Association, today, claims the Class AA championship of the United States, taking the deciding game from the Baltimore, International League pennant winner in the latter World Series yesterday, 6 to 2.

Winning the other two at Baltimore, 6 to 4 and 10 to 1, the Orioles came to St. Paul to lose the series, holding a 3 to 1 game lead.

Bracing, however, the Saints won, 3 to 2, made it two straight by winning Sunday, 2 to 1, and won out yesterday, 3 to 0.

A movement is now on foot here to arrange a series of nine games to be played between the champion team of the Pacific Coast League, the other Class AA organization of Organized Baseball.

GIANTS HAVE TITLE STANDING WITH FANS

REGARDED AS THE MOST UNPOPULAR TEAM EVER IN BIG SERIES.

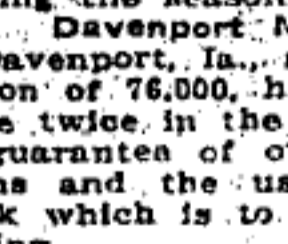

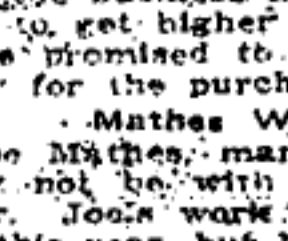

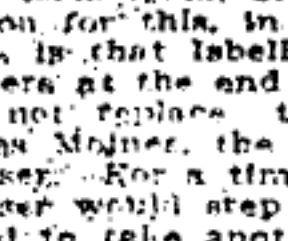
