

eff Kent had just finished a news conference announcing his signing with the Astros when someone tapped him on the shoulder. He turned to find Astros outfielder Lance Berkman smiling. "Hey, it's great to have you here," Berkman said. "We've got a really good bunch of guys. You're going to love it."

The two new teammates exchanged small talk for a bit, then Berkman scribbled his telephone number on a piece of paper, handed it to Kent and departed.

"If there's anything I can do to help you get settled here, don't hesitate to call," Berkman said.

Welcome to Jeff Kent's new world.

Kent says the Astros appealed to him because he makes his offseason home near San Antonio, because he believes the team has a chance to get to the playoffs and because he believes he'd fit nicely in a clubhouse alongside veterans such as Jeff Bagwell and Shane Reynolds.

He's going to find it's even better than he imagined. The Giants succeeded with Barry Bonds and Kent in the middle of their lineup, in part because the two men—and others—fed off the tension and occasional confrontations that became a staple of their relationship.

Bonds established himself as one of the best offensive players in history with Kent at his side. Kent flourished as well, averaging 29 home runs and 115 RBIs a season during his six years with Bonds. The Giants rode the duo to three playoff appearances, including the 2002 World Series.

"I think we motivated each other," Kent says. "We

elevated each other's game. We elevated our team's game. That'll be a time in my life that I'll never forget. Barry made me a better player."

If it worked in San Francisco for Kent, it may work just as well without the tension in Houston. He moves to a clubhouse where the best players—Bagwell, Berkman and Craig Biggio—are also the best teammates.

"You're going to sit in the same chair as everyone else when you're in this clubhouse," Bagwell says. "We don't have fistfights and things like that. I think we have a special way that we feel like we should play the game of baseball, and when guys get here they feel the same way."

To the Astros, Kent represents the offensive firepower they never really replaced when Moises Alou signed with the Cubs after the 2001 season. That's one reason Biggio agreed to shift from second base to center field to allow Kent to play his best defensive position.

"Why?" Biggio asks. "Because he makes us better."

To Kent, the Astros will be as close to a perfect environment as there is in baseball. If it all works out as hoped, Bagwell, Berkman and Kent will be the best 3-4-5 combination in the game, and the Astros will be back in the playoffs for the fifth time in seven years.

"There's a veteran character and personality, if you will, to this clubhouse," Kent says. "You just kind of assume your role and play hard and, if you do, then you won't get anybody biting on your butt."



Opportunity knocks

A new season brings a new chance for everyone, though some need it more than others.

Ken Griffey Jr., CF, Reds. He's not smiling much, at least not in public. Given a choice, though, the Reds would take a healthy Griffey over a happy one. Griffey says he got serious about his training in the offseason, and in spring training he has shown no signs of the leg problems that hindered him the past two seasons. He hit six home runs in his first 35 at-bats.

Erubiel Durazo, DH, A's. Last year, Carlos Pena was billed as the A's slugging first baseman of the future, but he was sent to the Tigers before the All-Star break. Now it's Durazo, whom A's general manager Billy Beane says he has coveted for years. Durazo, who played mostly first base with the Diamondbacks, is a big, strong hitter with the high on-base percentage the A's relish. He should stick around a lot longer than Pena—if he can avoid the trainer's room, That's no sure thing. Durazo, 29, has been on the disabled list six times in the past three seasons.

Hitting third in front of Barry Bonds should mean a lot of fastballs for a fastball hitter. Cruz struggled with the Blue Jays last year after hitting 34 homers and stealing 32 bases in 2001, but he struggled a lot less from the third spot than he did from the fifth spot. He had 18 more atbats hitting third but drove in 15 more runs and hit 74 points higher.

Kent takes advantage of Bonds' return

has something to do with a spike upward in Kent's performance since Bonds returned June 9. It's not that Kent was struggling. In fact, he co-led the team in RBIs through 60 games. But in the three games he hit behind Bonds, Kent had eight hits in 13 at-bats. Here's how Bonds helps Kent: When Bonds is on base, the pitcher feels he must throw fastballs to prevent

Bonds from stealing. Even when the pitcher retires Bonds, he has to work so hard mentally and physically, he may let up on Kent. When Kent plays to his strength, which is waiting for fastballs, he is a deadly hitter. When he goes after breaking balls off the plate, he plays right into the pitcher's hands.

TIME OFF: Bonds' biggest problem since returning after a seven-week absence from elbow surgery is his timing at the plate, which is still off. Manager Dusty Baker thinks Bonds will get his timing back by walking more. Bonds will see more pitches if he walks. The more pitches he sees, the faster he is able to recognize them. He had seven at-bats before his first hit. Baker also thinks Bonds' throwing will improve. Bonds' arm has been suspect over the years, but he has been working hard with rehabilitation coordinator Stan Conte on his throwing, and that may have made the arm stronger. Bonds' plan to slow runners is charging the ball quickly and getting off a fast throw. Now, he may be able to use the arm more to his advantage.

SEE A DIFFERENT GAME: By giving up switch-hitting, J.T. Snow has been able to dump the extra workload and concentrate on batting from the left, his dominant side. He spends all his practice time working on his timing, which is why Snow thinks he is hitting better this season, even against righthanded pitchers. By not having to concentrate on his unnatural righthanded stance, Snow feels more comfortable when he's hitting lefthanded. —Henry Schulman



However, it took the field and blew a 3-0 lead, losing to San Diego 10-3, as the Padres capitalized on the first error of the season by shortstop Rich Aurilia, which tied the score 3-3, and a throwing error by pitcher Steve Reed that paved the way for a seven-run eighth inning.

THENKING AHEAD: General manager Brian Sabean said he is acting under the impression that Kent will not be ready to play when he is eligible to come off the disabled list on June 24. That way, if he comes back on time, it's a pleasant surprise.

inning is stopping leadoff hitter Darryl Hamilton.

Hamilton has reached base safely to lead off games in 14 of his last 23 starts through last Saturday. His onbase percentage stands at .393, making him fourth among National League leadoff hitters.

LOOKING AHEAD: Beginning with Monday night's game against Colorado, the Giants were to play 12 of 14 games at home, with the two road games coming across the bay in Oakland. The home games include three with the Rockies, four against top division rival San Diego, two with Oakland and three with Texas. Expect the Giants to do well during the stretch even without Kent. —Henry Schulman
