Earl Sheely, Hard-Hitting Ex-First Baseman, Dies

Played With Three Teams In The Big Time; Father of White Sox Backstop

40 Years in O. B.

Earl Homer Sheely, general manager of the Seattle (Pacific Coast) club, one-time first baseman of the White Sox, Braves and Pirates, former scout and father of Hollis (Bud) Sheely, catcher of the White Sox, died at his home in Seattle, Wash., of a heart attack, September 16. Death came shortly after he had witnessed a game between San Francisco and Seattle. He previously suffered an attack on April 24 and had been sidelined most of the season.

A broken ankle, suffered in his youth and never properly set, handicapped Sheely throughout his career. However, he developed into a fielder who adequately covered the ground around first base, aided by his height of six feet, four inches and long arms, which made him an excellent target. He led the Pacific Coast League twice in hitting and batted as high as .320 in the majors, though his slowness afoot and the extra steps necessary because he hit from the right side of the plate cost him many hits that would have gone to a faster man.

Broke Into Game in '12

Born in Bushnell, Ill., February 12, 1895, Sheely attended high school in Spokane and Gonzaga University after his family moved to the Washington city. He broke in as a catcher with Vancouver of the old Northwest League in 1912, before he went to Salt Lake, then in the Pacific Coast League, where he switched to first base permanently. After playing four years at Salt Lake, he was purchased, along with Eddie Mulligan and Ernie Johnson, by the White Sox in the American League club's rehabilitation plans following the shattering of the team by the 1919 World's Series exposure.

Sheely immediately made good with the White Sox and batted .304 in 154 games in 1921. He increased his average to .317 in 1922, dropped to .296 in 1923, racked up a .320 average in 1924, .315 in 1925 and .299 in 1926 before he fell to .209 in 1927. Sold to Sacramento (Pacific Coast), Earl batted at a .381 clip in 1928, which prompted the Pirates to draft him. Although he hit .293 for Pittsburgh, injuries slowed him and the Pirates sold him to San Francisco, where he compiled the hefty batting average of .403 in 1930, which led the Braves to draft him to bring him back to the majors at the age of 36

years. Sheely hit only 273 for the Braves in 1931 and was sold to Los Angeles, where he had an average of .319 in 1932. Sold to Portland, he hit .359 for the Beavers in 1933 and .313 for Seattle in 1934 before retiring as an active player.

During his nine seasons in the majors, Sheely compiled a batting average of .301 and in a decade with Pacific Coast League clubs he had an average of .342. He was one of six batters in the Coast loop to better .400 in one season.

Following his retirement, Sheely scouted for the Red Sox and coached the Gonzaga University team. He also was baseball coach at St. Mary's College in Moraga, Calif.

When the Sacramento club was reorganized in the Pacific Coast League in 1944, Sheely was named manager. He remained in that position until after the 1946 season, when he was signed by Owner Emil Sick as general manager of the Seattle Rainiers to succeed Bill Mulligan, who took a similar post with Portland.

Sheely was married in 1918 to Mary Ruth Keyes, who survives him. They had two children, Hollis, who flew from Chicago on receipt of the news

Realignment Moves Run Into Blocks in Two Loops

ABILENE, Tex.—Realignment of minor leagues in the Southwest appears to be shelved at present for at least two leagues, the Class C Longhorn and West Texas-New Mexico.

President Hal Sayles of the Longhorn has revealed that although official action will not be taken until the annual meeting at Odessa, September 28, a decision by Roswell officials to continue in the league has thrown a block into the tentative changes set up at a recent conference, which put the New Mexico club into the West Texas-New Mexico, opening the way for a transfer of other clubs in the two leagues.

Business Manager Louis Bagwell notified Sayles that the Roswell board of directors had voted to remain in the Longhorn. He pointed out that the club could not sacrifice the advantages to be gained by the rivalries among Roswell, Artesia and Carlsbad in the league. Carlsbad recently took over the Vernon franchise.

With Roswell remaining in the Longhorn, there appears to be no chance for any changes, since all eight clubs plan to operate again next season. Sweetwater, though not set as to location, will retain its franchise. Owner A. C. Gonzalez announced he would inform the league at the annual meeting as to the 1953 site. He will give the fans of Sweetwater a chance to buy the franchise. If the offer is not taken, he may move to Del Rio, Hobbs or Winters-Ballinger.

Plans of the West Texas-New Mexico are not complete, but it is expected the league will remain intact, except possibly for Pampa. Owner Doug Mills has given the citizens of Pampa until October 1 to buy the franchise. If they don't, he says he has offers from Plainview, Tex., Elk City, Okla., and Hobbs, N. M. DON OLIVER.

Sam Still Brewer, pitcher for Brownsville (Gulf Coast), suffered fatal injuries when his automobile hit a bridge, five miles east of Marathon, near Alpine, Tex., September 12. He left Brownsville after his team had finished the season, two days previously, and apparently had driven all night.

Brewer made his last mound appearance in Corpus Christi, September 9, when he lost, giving him a 2-3 record. He was 28 years old.

Signed by Fort Smith (Western Association) in the winter of 1946, Brewer broke in with Oshkosh (Wisconsin State) in 1947. Brewer won 14 and lost 11 for Oshkosh, striking out 256, to lead the league and gain promotion to Minneapolis (American Association). With Sioux City (Western) in 1948, Brewer repeated his 1947 won-lost mark and struck out 169. The following year he won eight and lost nine for the Soos in 24 appearances.

Brewer was released to Vicksburg (Cotton States) in 1950, but refused to report and in 1951 was returned to the Soos, for whom he won 11 and lost nine.

Made a free agent, he first signed with Memphis and then St. Petersburg in 1952, before joining Brownsville.

Harvey A. Miller, 78, sports editor of the Columbus (O.) Dispatch from 1903 until 1924, died in Grant Hospital, Columbus, September 14.

After leaving the Dispatch, Miller entered the insurance business and he operated an office in Columbus at the time of his death. He was a graduate of Wittenberg College at Springfield, O., and he was captain of the Wittenberg football team in 1900.

Miller was instrumental in the late L. W. St. John's shift from Ohio Wesleyan University to Ohio State University as coach and athletic director. Under St. John's guidance, Ohio State became an athletic power.

Surviving Miller are his wife, Mrs. Helen M. Miller; two sons, William and Hugh, both of Columbus, and three grandchildren.

Mrs. Henri Roy, 33-year-old mother of Jean Pierre Roy, former minor league pitcher who also played in the Cuban and Panama Winter leagues, died at her home in Montreal, Can., September 13, after a long illness. Roy was last with Ottawa (International) for part of this season.

Maurice J. Pauley, former sports writer for the Chicago Herald-American, died at his home in Madeira Beach, Fla., September 13. He was executive secretary of the National Amateur Softball Association before his retirement. He was 63 years old.

Reserve Catcher Joe Montalvo, who had hit a pinch single, was on first with the bases loaded and one out in the eighth inning of the September 12 game with Memphis ahead by two runs. With the count 3-1 on Batter Ernie Oravetz, Montalvo yelled "Time" during Pitcher Dixie Howell's delivery. The ball, which was in the dirt, would have given Oravetz a walk, put Chattanooga only one run behind and left the bases loaded with one out. But the umpire called it "No Pitch" since Montalvo had called time. Then Oravetz struck out, the next batter flied out to end the inning (it would have scored a runner from third to tie the game) and Memphis won by two runs.

Montalvo had called time because he wanted to remove a package of cigarettes from his back pocket. Afterward, it was learned there were only three cigarettes in the package. ALLAN MORRIS.

'Longest Rhubarb' Ends as Brewers Lose Protest

MILWAUKEE, Wis.—What probably was the longest rhubarb in history took place in Milwaukee, September 15, in the first game of the second round of the American Association playoffs between the champion Milwaukee Brewers and runner-up Kansas City Blues.

The argument started after Don Bollweg, the second Blues batsman, was called out at approximately 8:20 p. m., and finally wound up in a hotel room at 3:30 the next morning.

The Brewers protested in the ninth inning when Catcher Mickey Owen entered the game with Milwaukee at bat for the last time after Catcher Roy Partee had left for a pinch-hitter in the top half of the inning. Manager Bucky Walters wanted Owen barred, claiming Mickey automatically eliminated himself as a legal player in the first inning when as a coach at first base he protested a called third strike on Bollweg by rushing up to the plate. Walters insisted that under a league rule, managers and coaches are automatically out of the game for such an act and that Owen should have been chased.

Plate Umpire John Mullen admitted after the game that he had erred in not chasing Owen in the first inning. Walters claimed that Mullen told him in the first inning that Bucky had no grounds for protest. Bucky, however, told the arbiter, "I'll protest officially at the proper time." That was in the ninth when Owen donned the armor.

The game ended at 10:30. Five hours later Richard (Red) Smith, general manager of the Brewers, after an all-night huddle, was told by League President Bruce Dudley, "I'm sorry that I cannot uphold your protest. It should have been filed in the first inning when Owen committed the infraction of a league rule." Kansas City won the game, 4 to 3. SAM LEVY.
